Beit Daniel - The Hope That Binds Us

Many of you know Beit Daniel well. It is our flagship synagogue that was built in 1991 thanks to the vision of the Daniel family and other generous philanthropists. Last month, we had the privilege of hosting Miriam Daniel and Laurence Wolff who are an integral part of the Daniel family legacy. Miriam serves as chairwoman of the "Friends of" board and Larry is treasurer. After a Havdallah, we hosted an intimate meal with community leaders, who shared heartfelt stories about their connections to Beit Daniel.

David Gilat, a long-time member and now the chairman of the board, spoke about the profound connection between Beit Daniel and the Hebrew word tikvah (hope). He highlighted how the word tikvah contains within it the Hebrew word kav, meaning "line." David described hope as the line that pulls humanity through challenging times and points us toward future possibilities. For him and thousands

more, Beit Daniel embodies tikvah. We unify people to face challenges together leading us toward better days.

Another community member, Edna Pearlman, reflected how Beit Daniel is always ready to welcome everyone with open arms, even on the hardest days. At the beginning of the war, when many places closed their doors due to the fear of rocket attacks, Beit Daniel remained steadfast, providing a safe haven for all who needed it. Edna shared how deeply meaningful it is to know that Beit Daniel is a constant presence - always available and offering support, no matter the circumstances.

While Beit Daniel remains our anchor, we now have 5 spiritual centers led by wonderfully inspiring, energetic, and committed rabbis serving diverse populations in Tel Aviv-Jaffa and surrounding suburbs. Our next newsletter will highlight some of their creative community-building efforts.

The Power of Art To Heal

Healing from the collective and individual trauma is and will be a long, protracted process. At the Daniel Centers we realize that we have an integral role in this through the power of prayer, spirituality, community and other mediums, like art and music.

Our recently renovated lobby, made possible in part through the support of The Herbert Bearman Foundation and Shlomo Agami, was designed to also serve as an art gallery. We were honored to exhibit the works of the late Tari Kipnis z"l, a resident of Kibbutz

Be'eri that faced unspeakable losses on October 7th.

Tari grew up near Gaza, served in the Navy, and built a life with his wife Lilach on the kibbutz, where the landscape of the sea turns into the Negev desert, serving as inspiration for Tari's art. Tari, Lilach, and their caregiver, Paul, were murdered in their Be'eri home. Opening night drew a

remarkable turnout, with our lobby overflowing and visitors gathering in our outdoor veranda. Kabbalat Shabbat in Park HaYarkon: Nature & Spirituality

In the fall, as the weather begins to cool, one of our cherished traditions is Kabbalat Shabbat in the park that brings hundreds together in community and prayer. We are fortunate that Beit Daniel is situated across from Park HaYarkon, Tel Aviv's largest park and green space. It is often compared to New York's Central Park or London's Hyde Park! The beauty of this evening is that it attracts passersby who are enjoying the park and find themselves drawn to the music and "avirah" (atmosphere).

Many of our newcomers would never have considered walking into a synagogue as they associate synagogues with constrained Orthodox traditions. But when surrounded by lush greenery and towering trees, the space feels open and accessible.

The afternoon begins with a family-friendly service designed especially for our youngest community members, filled with joyful play and engaging songs. Then, we begin our more

traditional service for the entire community.

These special evenings let us reconnect with nature and one another. And, our newcomers start to make their way to Beit Daniel for other “indoor” Shabbats and celebrations, further building a strong base of Reform Israeli Jews.

Mishkenot Ruth Daniel Guest House & Community Center: A Safe Haven in Wartime

One of the cornerstones of the Daniel Centers is our guesthouse, Mishkenot Ruth Daniel in Jaffa. Since October 7th, tourism in Israel has ground to a halt, with fewer than 1% of the usual number of visitors arriving in the country.

At the onset of the war, Mishkenot Ruth housed over 90 displaced families from the south. Once it was safe to return to their homes in Sderot, we opened our doors to soldiers and police officers stationed in the

area. These amazingly dedicated individuals, unable to travel home daily, have found a place here to rest, recharge, and feel cared for. It is our honor to provide them with a temporary sanctuary as they work tirelessly to protect and serve.

We look forward to the day when Mishkenot Ruth Daniel is once again filled with travelers from around the world, eager to explore the beauty and history of Israel. May that day come soon.
